Anchored on the Cultivation Theory by George Gerbner, which suggests that long-term exposure to media content can shape individuals' perceptions of reality, influencing their beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors, the study explores how MZFP effectively utilizes storytelling to address contemporary issues and promote Christian values. Through a thematic analysis encompassing faith, redemption, forgiveness, spiritual warfare, and ethical dilemmas, the paper examines how these films engage audiences in thoughtprovoking reflections on Christian principles and societal challenges. Furthermore, it investigates how the films raise awareness, challenge stigmas, promote dialogue, advocate for change, and celebrate virtues while condemning vices. By comparing and contrasting the thematic elements and societal impact of Last Man Standing and Legion, this study offers insights into the potential of Christian drama to influence perceptions, attitudes, and behaviors within society. Ultimately, the findings contribute to a deeper understanding of the role of film as a medium for fostering social consciousness and spiritual renewal in contemporary culture.

These films not only entertain but also engage audiences in discussions about hope, faith, morality, and social justice.

The significance of Christian drama in societal discourse lies in their ability to address complex moral and ethical dilemmas within the context of religious belief systems (McCormack *et al.*, 2021). Through compelling narratives and relatable characters, this drama provide audiences with opportunities for introspection and self-examination. Moreover, they offer a platform for exploring contemporary social issues from a Christian perspective, thereby contributing to ongoing conversations about ethics, justice, and human dignity.

Founded by Evangelist Mike and Gloria Bamiloye in the early 1990s, MZFP has become a leading voice in the Nigerian Christian film world, producing a wide range of dramatic works that resonate with audiences both locally and internationally.

The cultural impact of MZFP extends beyond entertainment, as its films have played a significant role in shaping public perceptions of Christianity and spirituality in Nigeria and beyond. Through compelling narratives, relatable characters, and touching storytelling, MZFP has captured the hearts and minds of viewers, inspiring them to reflect on their faith and personal journey of spiritual growth.

One of the defining features of MZFP is its commitment to promoting Christian values and ethics through its productions (Ogunleye, 2019). Many of its films explore themes such as salvation, redemption, forgiveness, and the power of prayer, offering audiences moral and spiritual insights that resonate with their lived experiences. This focus on spiritual and moral storytelling has earned MZFP a

loyal following among Christian audiences seeking uplifting and edifying content (Olayiwola, 2019).

Furthermore, MZFP has made significant strides in expanding the reach of Nigerian Christian movies beyond the borders of Nigeria (Adogame, 2008). Through partnerships with international ministries like Flaming Sword International (USA), The Kings Palace (TKP) Drama and Films Ministry (USA), Bethel Student Fellowship (USA), Immanuel Fellowship Films (Canada), Mount Zion movies have been able to reach a global audience eager for authentic Christian content. This global reach has not only increased the visibility of Nigerian Christian movies but has also contributed to a greater appreciation and understanding of African Christian perspectives on faith and spirituality.

The cultural impact of MZFP also extends to its influence on other filmmakers within the Nigerian Christian film circle. As one of the pioneering ministry in Christian Drama, MZFP has served as a role model and inspiration for emerging filmmakers seeking to use Drama as a tool for evangelism and social change. Its success has paved the way for the growth and development of Nigerian Christian movies, providing opportunities for new voices and perspectives to be heard (Olayiwola, 2019).

In this paper, we will explore the pivotal role of Christian drama in facilitating transformation, with a specific focus on two noteworthy productions from Mount Zion Film Productions: Last Man Standing (2017) and Legion (2021). By examining the narratives, themes, and impact of these films, this study aims to shed light on how Christian dramas serve as powerful instruments for catalyzing positive change within society. Through an in-depth analysis of these dramatic works, we will uncover the ways in which they engage with societal issues, promote moral values, and inspire audiences toward action.

Ministries like Mount Zion Film Productions have emerged as a leading voice, producing films that resonate with viewers and contribute to ongoing conversations about faith, morality, and social justice (Ogunleye, 2019).

Moreover, research by Thompson (2020) examined the portrayal of gender roles in Christian drama and its impact on audience perceptions of gender equality. The findings indicated that while some narratives reinforced traditional gender norms, others challenged stereotypical representations, prompting viewers to reconsider their attitudes towards gender dynamics within religious contexts.

Behavioral Implications

Furthermore, a meta-analysis by White *et al.*, (2018) synthesized findings from multiple studies investigating the impact of moral-themed dramas on moral decision-making. While the results varied across studies, the overall trend suggested that exposure to narratives emphasizing moral dilemmas and ethical considerations prompted viewers to reflect on their own behavior and make more conscientious choices in real-life situations.

Social cognitive theory (Bandura, 1986) offers a framework for understanding how individuals learn from observing modeled behaviors in media content. Moreover, transportation theory (Green & Brock, 2000) posits that immersion in narrative fiction leads to cognitive and emotional engagement, fostering a state of transportation wherein audiences become absorbed in the story world. This heightened state of involvement may enhance the persuasive impact of Christian dramas by reducing psychological resistance and increasing receptivity to message themes.

In the case of MZFP, such as *Last Man Standing* and *Legion*, the cultivation theory can help us understand how these films contribute to the reinforcement of Christian ideals and principles within society.
